

Job Losses Predicted - Next Two Decades

In a book called "The Future of Employment: How Susceptible are Jobs to Computerization" the following probabilities were assigned to job losses in the next two decades:

Telemarketers	0.99
Accountants and Auditors	0.94
Retail Salespersons	0.92
Technical Writers	0.89
Real Estate sales agents	0.86
Word Processing/Typists	0.81
Machinists	0.65
Commercial Pilots	0.55
Economists	0.43

Education Increases Regional Economic Prosperity

- Education is our most important source of sustainable competitive advantage.
- Just occupying the same geographic space as skilled workers benefits the less-educated workforce.
 - As others around you obtain more education, their wages rise—and yours do, too.



Better Education, Bigger Economic Benefits

 Adding one year of post-secondary education (certificates, associate, or bachelor's) to employed workers with at least a high school diploma increases real GDP per capita by 17.4% and real wages per worker by 17.8%

What Does Business Expect from Graduates

"College degrees and other credentials are more important than ever; but times have changed, and the vast majority of employers in America put acquired skills far ahead of alma mater or major when it comes to hiring."

Undergrad Major is Less Important than Reasoning

 Of 318 private and nonprofit organizations surveyed, 93% stated that a new hire's capacity to think critically, communicate clearly, and solve complex problems is more important than his/her undergraduate major.

Narrow technical skills have a shorter and shorter lifespan.

All majors, not just STEM, are important.

- To the question: Higher Education institutions in this country are graduating students with the skills and competencies that MY business needs:
 - On a scale of one to five with 5 meaning "strongly agree" and 1 meaning "strongly disagree"

Business Needs Higher Education

- Cost: Much of the cost increase over the past 5 years can be attributed to reduced state tax support which has forced an offset through increased tuition. Student debt issues then closely follow. Reluctance on the part of policy makers and the public to increase taxes means the students are bearing more and more of the burden.
 - Education must be affordable
- Capacity: In a time of diminished state capacity to fund education, Utah Colleges and Universities must find a way to increase their capacity to meet the goal set by the Governor and Legislature to meet the goal of having 66% of Utahns hold a postsecondary certificate or degree. Where we are now: 43%.
 - Higher Education must be accessible
- Workforce development: Higher Education must help meet the "skills gap" wherein companies face difficulties finding applicants with the needed skills. There is a pressing need for leaders in higher education to recognize and understand its role in meeting the demands of a global and competitive economy.
 - We must increase graduation rates.
